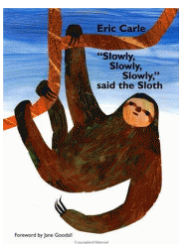


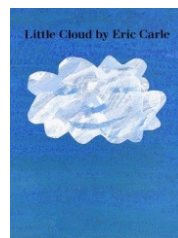
Baby/Toddler Storytime Week 4: Vocabulary / I Know Words!

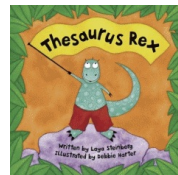

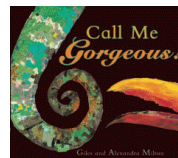

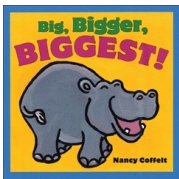
