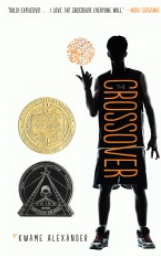

Kwame Alexander.

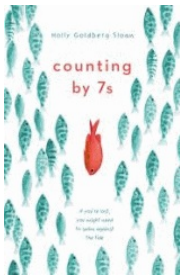

Rachel Vail.

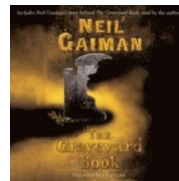

Neil Gaiman.

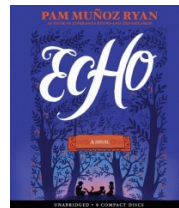

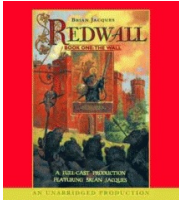

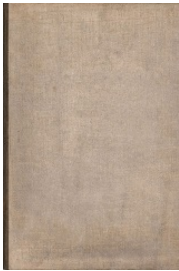


Redwall

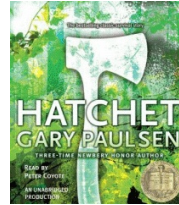
take to heart.
